THE SHADOW OF GOD

On this the Dedication Day of our new Temple and School Building, I am reminded of another, earlier, dedication which took place somewhere in the Sinai desert twenty or more centuries ago. At that time the Portable Tabernacle was constructed and then dedicated to the service of God. In relaying God's instructions Moses told the Tabernacle's architect, Bezalel (whose Hebrew name means "he who dwells in the Shadow of God") to first make an Ark, then Holy Vessels, and finally the Tabernacle itself.

"Moses, Our Teacher," objected the builder, "shouldn't the order be reversed? First one must build a structure and then he can create the things to put in it."

And so Moses changed his instructions. "To begin with, Bezalel, build a Tabernacle, then you may build an ark, and finally you may construct the Holy Vessels which are to be put inside."

We have built our Tabernacle and inside it we have placed many beautiful and costly items. One ingredient is missing—self dedication. Without dedication of the self our edifice is merely another symptom of the "edifice complex" which afflicts our civilization.

May we take the opportunity afforded us by this ceremony of dedication to pledge ourselves to the ideals of our Tradition. Then will our Tabernacle be complete and then will we, like Bezalel, dwell in the very shadow of God.

That at said meeting Harry Rosenblum was elected President, Moses Cohen Vice President, Max Rosenblum Secretary, and Mayer Becker and Barney Johnowitz trustees of the said Am Echod Congregation.

That said Congregation adopted as its Corporate name, Am Echod Congregation.

And that at said meeting this affiant acted as chairman.

HISTORY OF CONGREGATION AM ECHOD

Now that we have the time and place of our beginning firmly established, let us look behind the scenes to learn how this all came about.

In October, 1947, on the occasion of our 50th, or Golden Anniversary, Rabbi Solomon Jacobson disclosed the existence of a book of vital importance to the Jewish Community of Waukegan, — the first book of minutes of our Congregation!

Of course, it is written in Yiddish, and Rabbi Jacobson referred to it many times in his review of our 50 years of existence. It covers the "baby years" of Congregation Am Echod, from 1896 to 1901.

So let us take first things first. The foregoing takes care of the official recording in the annals of Lake County's Historical Archives. However, our congregation was already functioning as a formal organized body since Sunday, September 20, 1896, which was three days after *Yom Kippur*, for it was on that date that a man by the name of Goldberg, of 549 Canal Street, Chicago, had come to Waukegan, to organize this congregation. Who was this Goldberg? He was a *mohel* who had been called in from Chicago several times in the line of duty. Apparently, this gave him status,

and made him an authority on the subject of organizing congregations! He did an excellent job. In a foreword to the book of minutes referred to, he wrote in a fine Yiddish hand as follows: "We, the Jews of Waukegan, decided to band together and unite with our brethren, into one body, and this we began to do on the 1st day of the *Sidra* of *Zos Habracha*, in the year *Tarnaz* "5657" (1896).

I wish to introduce, at this point, a warm human-interest account of what led to this *mohel* Goldberg's coming to Waukegan, and thus launching our Congregation. It seems that there was a catastrophic controversy in the loosely-knit *minyán* that had been responsible for services up to that time. The tempest in the teapot arose on the delicate point of who was to be the cantor (shall we say in language we cannot misconstrue: *Ver vett daven Musaf?*) for the High Holidays of that fateful year 1896. (In many congregations that problem has still not been settled.) But in 1896, one faction wanted a certain Mr. Becker, and the other faction wanted one other of our local dignitaries, whose identity has not been clearly established. It is told that feeling ran so high between these two groups, that one of them had confiscated the *Sefer Torah* (and it was a borrowed *Sefer Torah* at that) and hid it on a farm, thus making almost impossible any service at all. How services actually were held, and who did *daven*, is a truth that now lies interred in the limbo of the past, but once *Yom Kippur* was over, this *mohel* Goldberg came from Chicago and met with the *minyán* to work out a peaceful solution. Apparently he did, and it was his own wording "That now all the Jews of Waukegan shall work and worship together, and they shall be *Am Echod* – One People." It was this wording that gave our Congregation the name which it adopted and which it bears: *Am Echod* – One People. Good work, *mohel* Goldberg, and may you rest in peace.



The first actual meeting of the Congregation was on September 26, 1896. Elected as officers at that meeting – and this is positive – were the following: President, Samuel Schwartz; Vice-President, Moshe (M. H. or Harry) Rosenblum; Secretary, Israel Levin; Treasurer, Mayer Kubelsky; 1st trustee, Hayim Mordecai (Max) Rosenblum; 2nd trustee, Mayer Becker.

The thirteen Founding Families of Congregation Am Echod were, accordingly:

In addition, the following names are found in the original minute book of Congregation Am Echod: Israel Levin, Julius Horwitz (entered simply as “Hoorwich”), Abraham Goldberg and Max Sachs – none of whom retained long-time residence in Waukegan. However, others who subsequently became permanent members of the Am Echod family in the late 1890’s and the early 1900’s were the Hymen Finkelstein, Harry Hadelman, Charles Morrison, Charles Jacobs, Jacob Blumberg, Samuel Meyer and Samuel Eisenberg families.

Altogether, it seems that by October 23, 1896, there might have been about twenty Jewish families in Waukegan.



How did they worship in those early years? It seems that there was a *minyan* which had probably started by 1893. This *minyan* has been variously reported as meeting at the Samuel Schwartz home and the Mayer Kubelsky home, but mainly at the Abraham Diamond home. This *minyan* continued meeting at the Diamond home until *Yom Kippur* of 1897, shortly after which it was moved to the home where resided the Max Rosenblum and the Becker families. In 1901, the Congregation moved to its own structure. However, before we turn to a new chapter in the life of Am Echod, when they purchased a building for a synagogue, we must read a few excerpts from the minutes, to catch a glimpse of the "shul" life at that formative stage of our Congregation.

1897—Balance in treasury 30¢. If a member owes money, he is dropped.

1897—A new member must pay \$1.00 in cash.

1897—50¢ fine for talking during service.

1898—First mention of securing a *shocket*.

Also some rules from our By-Laws:

1. The Brothers must live in friendship, one with the other, and help a Brother as far as possible.
2. Each member must attend the meeting when he is called by the President.
3. Every member must be quiet when the meeting is open.
4. When a member has *yahrzeit*, every member must attend the *minyan*.
5. As soon as the Treasurer has collected \$10.00, he must deposit it in a safe bank, and give the note to the trustees.
6. Each one who has *yahrzeit*, must pay 50¢ to the Brotherhood.
7. No enmity shall be harbored by a member, when by error of the President, he was not given as much honor as the next one.
8. When a brother is sick, the President must send a member every day to visit, and report same to President.
9. Every member must pay 10¢ a week.
10. Every officer must come to meetings, and when he doesn't come, he must bring a good excuse, if not, he is fined 50¢.

With that we return to the synagogue building. We find it mentioned for the first time on March 3, 1901, when President Samuel Schwartz announces that he knows of a good place that can be purchased. Let us say now, for the sake of brevity, that the building, a sash and door shop on south County Street, just south of Lake Street, was converted into a synagogue, Orthodox style — of

On July 17, 1927, the cornerstone of 330 was laid, and the contractor was Mr. Ben Zide. Into that cornerstone, went a sealed tube containing a document which read as follows:

IN MEMORIAM

We whose signatures are attached hereto, commemorating the laying of this cornerstone, the foundation of a New Synagogue, to fit and inspire the coming generations with a house of worship, that will inbed in the hearts and minds of our children the inspiration for the sacred and traditional Judaism which carried us faithfully throughout the ages.


That, when with the elapse of time, the help of GOD, this Holy House of Worship, is to give way to a larger and mightier Sanctuary, that the same traditional Judaism shall continue to be, as a cherished will and wish, of those whose signatures are attached hereto.

Signed and sealed, this Holy Day, Sunday July 17, 1927.

(For the names referred to, please see plaque in our Temple building.)

We relinquished the Masonic Temple and held Passover services in a grand, inspiring, beautiful new house of Worship.

As for Religious School activity, there were earlier attempts, with a regularly functioning Sunday School from 1914 which had one teacher and about 15 pupils. Classes met in the Central School. Along about 1917, the Sunday School moved to the south County Street Synagogue, and continued there until Am Echod moved to the Masonic Temple. It was there that a full-fledged Sunday School program came into being. Hebrew classes were held on Tuesdays and Thursdays.



The following organizations and dates have an important place in our history:

The Women's Auxilliary of Temple Am Echod was organized in 1921.

B'nai B'rith Men's Lodge 1922.

Cemetary purchased in 1928. (August 31st).

Sharus League 1931. (Young Married's Club)

B'nai B'rith Women's Chapter 1937.

Hadassah 1938.

Men's Club 1939. (functioned briefly)

Affiliation of our Sisterhood with Women's League of United Synagogue July 11, 1940.

Book of Life established 1942. (brainchild and gift of Mrs. Louis Blumberg.)

Golf and Sunset site purchased 1959.

Golf and Sunset ground breaking December 11, 1966.

The foregoing outlines our history, with dates and events that played an important part in our being.

It is interesting to note that, as the years went by, to the day of this dedication, how our interest in the educational aspect of our Congregation grew. In the beginning, our synagogue occupied the centermost point of our activity, with the school as an adjunct. As was previously related, our school consisted of 15 pupils and

one teacher in 1914, whereas today – although our interest in our synagogue is as great, if not greater, than that of former years—the building we are dedicating today has 12 large classrooms and our school system consists of 204 students, a staff of a principal and 13 teachers.



Our membership has grown in proportion, and today we are blessed with a large group of young people who are active in our Congregation, which promises well for our future.

Over these many years, we have indeed been "Congregation Am Echod – One People!"

The organizations of our Jewish Community have cooperated beautifully with one another, and a spirit of oneness pervades our entire Congregation.

As to our future as a Congregation – one cannot help but be an optimist regarding our future when we consider:

The almost 100% response to our fund-raising efforts for this edifice, with half the effort we thought we would need;

The acceptance of chairmanships, and responsibilities by all that were asked to help in this great effort;

A President – Alton Barnett – who sparked the entire effort, and followed through every phase in person, to insure the results you see today;

A Board that had a record of almost 100% attendance when called upon;

A Sisterhood that accepted large responsibilities, under the leadership of Mrs. Max (Helen) Lerner, with a spirit that we would all do well to emulate;

A school system of 204 students, whose parents and grandparents are or were, part and parcel of this edifice and Congregation, to bring us the future leadership we need.

With these assets, can one doubt the future? It is in good hands!

As we close this portion of the history of our Congregation, we gratefully acknowledge the extensive use of the “History of the Early Waukegan Jewish Community” that was researched and written by Rose Janowitz Lidschin for the Congregation archives. We also gratefully acknowledge the use of the 50th Anniversary address by Rabbi Solomon Jacobson. Without these materials this report could not have been submitted by Robert Goldstein.


